From the Pastor's Desk: **When the Bible Becomes a Bludgeon**

I will be the first to admit that I am very bad at quoting the Bible chapter and verse. I can usually give you a general idea where something (or if something) is stated in scripture. I know certain books better than others. Still, I know how to resource, how to read scripture through a critical lens, how to go back to the original language and parse words for true meaning, and how to bring scripture to life in the current culture. I try not to take scripture out of context, preferring to study and parse so that the Words sing forth the gospel, even in their heaviest parts.

We recently heard Romans 13:1 quoted as a Biblical support for the zero tolerance policy at our nation's border. Wherever you land on the subject of border security (and you are free to disagree with my position), when someone quotes chapter and verse from the Bible to support a national law, you should take issue with his or her words. Our Bill of Rights reads, in the First Amendment, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances." The Bible is not the law of the land, and using it in any way to justify a legal action is problematic.

Yes, I take issue with this use of scripture. But this is not the first time in our nation's long history that Romans 13:1 has been used to justify national law. It is not the first time in our nation's history quoting Romans 13:1 ff has justified taking children from their parents because, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God. Therefore, who whoever resists authority resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment," was used to justify laws that were set to tear Native American (first nation) children from their families to be re-educated at boarding schools. It was used as the justification for ripping children from their mothers' arms to be sold on auction blocks as property in the age of slavery. These verses have a heavy history of being ripped from their context to support more than just these horrible historical acts. They were used to support the Americans of Japanese descent internment camps of World War II. They were used to support Jim Crow laws and Red Line laws. They were used to enable judges to turn their heads away from lynching. These verses are the hallmark of white power twisting scripture to keep others down. These verses have been wielded to bludgeon others into submission, including during the Holocaust.

These verses are not the only Biblical passages that have been used in this way. There are passages that have been used to support the killing of people of other religions. There are passages that have been used to ruin the lives of LGBTQ+ people. There are passages that have been used to suppress the voices and actions of women. There is a heavy history that comes with scripture being ripped from its context and used to justify the actions of the powerful.

We are called to redeem scripture from misuse. Martin Luther called the Bible the cradle in which the Christ Child is laid. If we hold this to be true, then using scripture to bludgeon others is never right.

Romans 13:1-7 is a controversial passage amongst Biblical scholars because it does not seem to fit the flow of Romans. Some scholars believe it is a late addition to the text; others believe that it is a call to only obey government because Jesus is returning soon; still, others believe that the text implies that governments are an instrument of God so long as evaluating that government in light of the gospel reveals it to be fulfilling the law of love (which is referenced in Romans 8-10). In other words, this is not a text that should be used to defend unjust laws that do not reflect God's love.

I caution you—be judicious with your use of scripture. Always seek the Christ Child dwelling in the words, because Jesus is indeed always there. When you find the Christ Child, you will find that love is the fulfillment of the law.

2018 Synod Assembly: Sharing in Hope

The 2018 Central States Synod Assembly was held June 7–9 at Bethany College in Lindsborg, KS. Our theme was *Sharing in Hope: God's Story, Our Voices*. Our emphasis was on evangelism. Special guests included ELCA churchwide representative, Rev. Ruben Duran, Director and team leader for Congregational Vitality Team, ELCA. in addition to providing a **churchwide update**, and sharing a **video message from Presiding Bishop Eaton**, Rev. Duran also presented a workshop entitled "**Detectives of Divinity**" which invites us to re-enter God's world and discover anew: What in the world is God doing? How can we participate in it? and How can we do this ecumenically? Saturday morning, Rev. Duran led the closing worship service delivering a sermon reminding us that Jesus rose from the dead and "nothing else matters."

We were lucky to also have a team of Glocal Musician Educators at Synod Assembly. They taught a variety of uplifting songs from diverse cultures taking us on a journey exploring the relationship between worship and culture the Lutheran World Federation organizes in terms of four dimensions:

- Transcultural - Having the same substance for everyone everywhere, beyond culture
- Contextual - Varying according to the local situation
- Counter-cultural - Challenging what is contrary to the Gospel in a given cult
- Cross-cultural - Sharing elements across cultures



The following are summer reading selections made by STHS Book Club. Enjoy a summer of great reading! Book Club resumes Sept. 24. Please join us!



Enemy Women by Paulette Jiles. 2002. Historical fiction. Poet and memoirist Jiles enters new territory, both historically and stylistically, with her first novel, which is set in the Missouri Ozarks during the Civil War. Adair Colley is 18 years old and leads a happy, untroubled life with her father, brother, and younger sisters on the family homestead in southeastern Missouri until the war, in the form of the Missouri Union Militia, touches them. After taking the family's possessions, the militia sets fire to the house and barn. Brother John Lee escapes to the woods, but patriarch Marquis Colley is accused of disloyalty, badly beaten, and taken away, leaving the three girls on their own. Though innocent, Adair is soon arrested for spying and sent to prison in St. Louis. How she survives that institution's abominable conditions, falls in love with the major in charge, and manages to return to her old home make for an enthralling narrative. Very little has been written about the degrading condition endured by female prisoners, who were often unjustly accused, and the details that Jiles unearthed via her research add much to our knowledge of the Civil War. -- Library Journal

Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI by David Grann. 2017. Non-fiction. In the 1920s, the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Nation in Oklahoma. After oil was discovered beneath their land, the Osage rode in chauffeured automobiles, built mansions, and sent their children to study in Europe. Then, one by one, the Osage began to be killed off. The family of an Osage woman, Mollie Burkhart, became a prime target. One of her relatives was shot. Another was poisoned. And it was just the beginning, as more and more Osage were dying under mysterious circumstances, and many of those who dare to investigate the killings were themselves murdered. As the death toll rose, the newly created FBI took up the case, and the young director, J. Edgar Hoover, turned to a former Texas Ranger named Tom White to try to unravel the mystery. White put together an undercover team, including a Native American agent who infiltrated the region, and together with the Osage began to expose one of the most chilling conspiracies in American history. -- Penguinrandomhouse.com

The Tender Bar: a Memoir by J.R. Moehringer. 2005. (Moehringer is cousin to St. Louis radio personality, Mcgraw Milhaven, who is himself a character in the memoir) J.R. Moehringer grew up captivated by a voice. It was the voice of his father, a New York City disc jockey who vanished before J.R. spoke his first word. Sitting on the stoop, pressing an ear to the radio, J.R. would strain to hear in that plummy baritone the secrets of masculinity and identity. Though J.R.'s mother was his world, his rock, he craved something more, something faintly and hauntingly audible only in The Voice. At eight years old, suddenly unable to find The Voice on the radio, J.R. turned in desperation to the bar on the corner, where he found a rousing chorus of new voices. The alphas along the bar--including J.R.'s Uncle Charlie, a Humphrey Bogart look-alike; Colt, a Yogi Bear sound-alike; and Joey D, a softhearted brawler--took J.R. to the beach, to ballgames, and ultimately into their circle. They taught J.R., tended him, and provided a kind of fathering-by-committee. Torn between the stirring example of his mother and the lurid romance of the bar, J.R. tried to forge a self somewhere in the center. But when it was time for J.R. to leave home, the bar became an increasingly seductive sanctuary, a place to return and regroup during his picaresque journeys. Time and again the bar offered shelter from failure, rejection, heartbreak--and eventually from reality. In the grand tradition of landmark memoirs, *The Tender Bar* is suspenseful, wrenching, and achingly funny. A classic American story of self-invention and escape, of the fierce love between a single mother and an only son, it's also a moving portrait of one boy's struggle to become a man, and an unforgettable depiction of how men remain, at heart, lost boys. -- Left Bank Books

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Heat Waves & Storms—Stay Cool, Stay Safe

High humidity and elevated nighttime temperatures are key ingredients in causing heat-related illness and mortality. Heat stress occurs when the body is unable to cool itself effectively. Normally, the body can cool itself through sweating, but when humidity is high, sweat will not evaporate as quickly, potentially leading to *heat stroke*. When there's no break from the heat at night, it can lead to health problems, and pose *special* health risks to the poor, older adults and people with chronic medical conditions. It is important that seniors know how to safeguard against the risks. Air conditioning is one of the best protections against heat-related illness and death. Visit senior centers, movie theaters, libraries or malls to cool off—even for just a few hours.



Heat stroke is the most serious heat-related illness. When the body is unable to control its temperature, it rises rapidly and sweating mechanisms fail. Body temperature may rise to 106°F or higher within 10–15 minutes. *Heat stroke* can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not provided.

Signs of Heat Stroke:

- High body temperature (above 103°F)
- Red, hot, dry skin (no sweating)
- Rapid, strong pulse
- Throbbing headache
- Dizziness, nausea, confusion
- Unconsciousness

These are signs of a *life-threatening* emergency. Have someone call 911 while you begin cooling the person:

Get him to a shady area.

Cool him rapidly however you can: Immerse him in a cool tub of water or shower; spray him with cool water from a garden hose; sponge him with cool water; wrap him in a cool, wet sheet and fan him vigorously.

Monitor body temperature; continue cooling efforts until body temperature drops to 101–102°F. If he is conscious and able to swallow, give cool water or non-alcoholic, decaffeinated beverages.

Heat exhaustion is less severe, more common, and occurs when the body becomes severely dehydrated. If left untreated, it leads to heat stroke. If you suspect a person is having a problem with the heat, err on the side of caution and insist he gets into shade and cool down.

Signs of Heat Exhaustion:

- Heavy sweating, cold, clammy skin
- Dizziness or fainting
- A weak and rapid pulse
- Muscle cramps
- Fast, shallow breathing
- Nausea, vomiting or both


